Also provided are clarifications as well as responses to questions received after Addendum #1 up to and including today's close of questions deadline.

Description(s) of additional equipment, materials, and/or products approved "as equal" after Addendum #1 prior to bid opening are also provided in this Addendum. Please note that these approvals/disapprovals are made by the Engineer for this specific project based on the best available information and shall not be construed as precedent for approval/disapproval on other future projects of The Thrasher Group, Inc. **The Contractor shall be responsible for any and all changes necessary to accommodate any approved "as equal" equipment, materials, and/or products at no additional cost to the Owner.**

Attention is directed to the fact that while information provided in this Addendum may reference specific locations in the Plans and Specifications, the information provided shall be applied to all applicable locations in the Plans and Specifications.

Please acknowledge receipt of all Addenda in the Bid Opening Requirements and in the Bid Form.

A. GENERAL**1. CHANGES TO DAVIS BACON WAGE RATES**

Please discard the Davis Bacon Wage Rates included in the Contract Documents as advertised and replace them with the attached Davis Bacon Wage Rates dated January 1, 2021. Another check of wage rates will be performed on Friday, January 15, 2021. If there are any changes at that time, they will be provided by Addendum as necessary.

2. VIRTUAL BID OPENING INFORMATION

As noted in Addendum #1, the bid opening date and time were changed from Wednesday, January 20, 2021 at 2:00 PM to Tuesday, January 26, 2021 at 10:00 AM at the location originally indicated in the Advertisement for Bids. Bids will be publicly opened and read aloud at that time.

B. SPECIFICATIONS**CHANGES TO SPECIFICATIONS****1. Section 01020 – Measurement and Payment**

Add Paragraph 1.1.B.17 to read as follows:

Bid Item #17 (per Cubic Yard (CY)) - Undercutting of Unsuitable Material, Disposal of Unsuitable Material and Backfill with Dumped Rock Gutter and/or Crusher Run Stone – This item shall include all labor, material, and equipment necessary for this work.

Add Paragraph 1.1.b.18 to read as follows:

Bid Item #18 (per Thousand Gallons) – Organic Seeding Pumped from the Hazelton Wastewater Treatment Plant to the New Bruceton Mills Wastewater Treatment Plant. – This item shall include all labor, material, and equipment necessary for this work. The quantity provide is 20,000 Gallons or 20 (Thousand Gallons).

C. DRAWINGS

CHANGES TO DRAWINGS

1. Delete Door #D16 from the door schedule on Sheet 94.

D. QUESTIONS AND RESPONSES

QUESTION

1. What will be the method of delivery of any excess sludge to the Pete Ruth Farm? Is there a tank we will dump into or will it need to be land applied? Will we need to screen it or will the farmer?

RESPONSE

The Contractor shall deliver any excess sludge as directed to the farm at a designed location on the far. The farmer will be responsible for all work after that.

QUESTION

2. Regarding Section 11325 Complete Pre-Treatment Plant with Tank Mounted Semi-Cylindrical Screen and Grit Classifier, Paragraph 2.02B - Please confirm that a screenings bagger is not required as the screen is discharging into an 18 inch dia. PVC screenings tubes per Plan Sheet 39.

RESPONSE

Specification Section 11325, Paragraph 2.03.F states that a bagger is not required.

QUESTION

3. Regarding Section 11325 Complete Pre-Treatment Plant with Tank Mounted Semi-Cylindrical Screen and Grit Classifier, Paragraph 2.02B - Please confirm that local control stations are required for the screen and grit classifier per Plan Sheet E13. Local control stations are not mentioned in this spec section.

RESPONSE

While they are not mentioned specifically in Specification Section 11325, they would be considered part of the "complete integrated package", as mentioned in Section 1.04.C. - "Manufacturer shall provide screen, tank, grit classifier, motors, gear reducers, controls, control panels, and lifting attachments as a complete integrated package"

QUESTION

4. Regarding Section 11325 Complete Pre-Treatment Plant with Tank Mounted Semi-Cylindrical Screen and Grit Classifier, Paragraph 2.02B -. This paragraph outlines a NEMA 4X stainless steel main control panel for outdoor installation. Per specification plan E18, it appears the Headworks control panel is located indoors in an electrical room. Based on this, is a NEMA 12 painted steel enclosure suitable for indoor installation acceptable in lieu of the NEMA 4X stainless steel enclosure?

RESPONSE

Yes. A NEMA 12 painted (gray) steel enclosure will be acceptable for this panel.

QUESTION

5. Regarding Plan Sheet E-13 – Panel – B, Headworks Control Panel – Regarding the “Modbus over fiber” note, the PLC type specified in 11325 is a MicroLogix 1400, which is capable of Modbus TCP communication. Please confirm Modbus TCP communication from the Headworks control panel is acceptable.

RESPONSE

Yes, the protocol would be Modbus TCP, regardless of media (fiber/CAT5e). The conduit schedule calls out CAT5e for SCADA communications. Fiber would be required only if the distance is over 328 feet (100 meters).

QUESTION

6. Regarding Plan Sheet E-13 – Panel – B, Headworks Control Panel – Regarding the “Modbus over fiber” note, we were not able to locate any requirements for an Ethernet / Fiber optic converter in Section 11325. Is an unmanaged type Ethernet / Fiber optic converter acceptable?

RESPONSE

Yes, an unmanaged media converter is acceptable. It shall be of “industrial” type.

QUESTION

7. Do materials such as electrical conduit, fittings, boxes, straps, etc. fall under the AIS act?

RESPONSE

Yes.

QUESTION

8. 16100-3 2.3 Wire Connections and Devices mentions that all connections shall be *soldering with a fusible metal alloy or by use of solderless connectors such as Burndy "Hydent", or equal*. Is that going to be enforced on this project or will standard wire connectors such as wire nuts, Buchanan crimps, or wago connectors be allowed?

RESPONSE

Buchanan crimp-on connections (with associated nylon covers) and wire nuts will be acceptable. Wago connectors are not acceptable.

QUESTION

9. A. Who will be supplying the control panel and motor control center (MCC)?
B. I didn't see an MCC scheduled in the plans. It is vaguely described in Specification Section 11375. Based on past experience, we would not recommend equipment vendors supply the MCC. Can you please include a MCC schedule on the plans that details starters, VFDs, buttons, & etc.? Without a schedule it will make things difficult.

RESPONSE

10. As per Specification 11375, the ICEAS Treatment System vendor will supply the control panel and the MCC in accordance with that specification. No other information is available at bidding.

QUESTION

11. As it pertains to the SBR treatment system manufacturer, Specification Section 11375; it mentions use of alternate Alfa Laval system see section 01100. I couldn't find a section 01100 in the specs. Will Alfa Laval be allowed to be used in this project?

RESPONSE

12. As per Specification Section 11375, Paragraph 1.3, the Basis of Design Manufacturer is ICEAS® System by Xylem Inc. Sanitaire Products. Alfa Laval Ashbrook Simon Hartley is listed as an alternative that may be used. Other equivalent systems will be considered in accordance with Instruction to Bidders Article 11 and Specification Section 11375 Paragraph 1.4. Section 01100 is not included in the Specifications.

QUESTION

- 13 As it pertains to the demolition at existing WWTP, are the concrete structures to be completely removed or to be removed 1' below surface, fractured, and filled?

RESPONSE

14. This question was addressed in Addendum #1, the second Question labelled #1. Generally described, the concrete structures do not have to be totally removed. They shall be removed to 1' below the regraded finished elevation, fractured, and filled as per Specification Section 01655 Paragraph 3.3.D.

QUESTION

15. Is there a specification for the chemical mixer pump on Sheet 38?

RESPONSE

Yes. Please see Specification Section 11410 - Mechanical Mixer.

QUESTION

16. As for the Specification Section 11308 for the Sludge Holding Tank (SHT) pumps. The specification calls for 1EA hoist to be supplied. Wouldn't there need to be 2EA due to the installation type shown here?

RESPONSE

The design intent as shown in the Drawings (e.g. Sheet 37) is to have one (1) decant pump each with one (1) hoist each in each of the two (2) sludge holding tanks. Specification Section 11308 should be interpreted in light of the Paragraph 2.1.A which says "The Contractor shall furnish, complete in place, a submersible non-clog SHT decant pump to be installed in each of the two (2) aerated sludge holding tanks (SHT)...."

QUESTION

17. Access to the site is very limited. It will be impossible to use the existing WWTP road and site to access the new construction. Will we be able to access the new construction another way? Please add a temporary construction access road to the plans. Is it possible to access through the adjacent board of education property?

RESPONSE

These concerns were addressed in Addendum #1 Clarification #7. No other access is provided for the project. Contractor may make any other arrangements with adjacent property owners if they choose to do so.

QUESTION

18. Sheets E5 & E6 have conduits/conductors crossed out. Please advise what this means.?

RESPONSE

Conduits and conductor that are crossed out (stricken) will not be required in this project. An office building had been included in the project, but was removed due to funding concerns/

E. CLARIFICATIONS

1. Section 01020 – Measurement and Payment

Paragraph 1.1.B.16 Bid Item #16 (Thousand Gallons) – This is to clarify that the bidding unit is per “thousand gallons.” The quantity provided is 100,000 gallons or 100 (Thousand Gallons).

The classifications are listed in alphabetical order of "identifiers" that indicate whether the particular rate is a union rate (current union negotiated rate for local), a survey rate (weighted average rate) or a union average rate (weighted union average rate).

Union Rate Identifiers

A four letter classification abbreviation identifier enclosed in dotted lines beginning with characters other than "SU" or "UAVG" denotes that the union classification and rate were prevailing for that classification in the survey. Example: PLUM0198-005 07/01/2014. PLUM is an abbreviation identifier of the union which prevailed in the survey for this classification, which in this example would be Plumbers. 0198 indicates the local union number or district council number where applicable, i.e., Plumbers Local 0198. The next number, 005 in the example, is an internal number used in processing the wage determination. 07/01/2014 is the effective date of the most current negotiated rate, which in this example is July 1, 2014.

Union prevailing wage rates are updated to reflect all rate changes in the collective bargaining agreement (CBA) governing this classification and rate.

Survey Rate Identifiers

Classifications listed under the "SU" identifier indicate that no one rate prevailed for this classification in the survey and the published rate is derived by computing a weighted average rate based on all the rates reported in the survey for that classification. As this weighted average rate includes all rates reported in the survey, it may include both union and non-union rates. Example: SULA2012-007 5/13/2014. SU indicates the rates are survey rates based on a weighted average calculation of rates and are not majority rates. LA indicates the State of Louisiana. 2012 is the year of survey on which these classifications and rates are based. The next number, 007 in the example, is an internal number used in producing the wage determination. 5/13/2014 indicates the survey completion date for the classifications and rates under that identifier.

Survey wage rates are not updated and remain in effect until a new survey is conducted.

Union Average Rate Identifiers

Classification(s) listed under the UAVG identifier indicate that no single majority rate prevailed for those classifications; however, 100% of the data reported for the classifications was union data. EXAMPLE: UAVG-OH-0010 08/29/2014. UAVG indicates that the rate is a weighted union average rate. OH indicates the state. The next number, 0010 in the example, is an internal number used in producing the wage

determination. 08/29/2014 indicates the survey completion date for the classifications and rates under that identifier.

A UAVG rate will be updated once a year, usually in January of each year, to reflect a weighted average of the current negotiated/CBA rate of the union locals from which the rate is based.

WAGE DETERMINATION APPEALS PROCESS

1.) Has there been an initial decision in the matter? This can be:

- * an existing published wage determination
- * a survey underlying a wage determination
- * a Wage and Hour Division letter setting forth a position on a wage determination matter
- * a conformance (additional classification and rate) ruling

On survey related matters, initial contact, including requests for summaries of surveys, should be with the Wage and Hour Regional Office for the area in which the survey was conducted because those Regional Offices have responsibility for the Davis-Bacon survey program. If the response from this initial contact is not satisfactory, then the process described in 2.) and 3.) should be followed.

A four letter classification abbreviation identifier enclosed in dotted lines beginning with characters other than ""SU"" or ""UAVG"" denotes that the union classification and rate were prevailing for that classification in the survey. Example: PLUM0198-005 07/01/2014. PLUM is an abbreviation identifier of the union which prevailed in the survey for this classification, which in this example would be Plumbers. 0198 indicates the local union number or district council number where applicable, i.e., Plumbers Local 0198. The next number, 005 in the example, is an internal number used in processing the wage determination. 07/01/2014 is the effective date of the most current negotiated rate, which in this example is July 1, 2014.

Union prevailing wage rates are updated to reflect all rate changes in the collective bargaining agreement (CBA) governing this classification and rate.

Survey Rate Identifiers

Classifications listed under the ""SU"" identifier indicate that no one rate prevailed for this classification in the survey and the published rate is derived by computing a weighted average rate based on all the rates reported in the survey for that classification. As this weighted average rate includes all rates reported in the survey, it may include both union and non-union rates. Example: SULA2012-007 5/13/2014. SU indicates the rates are survey rates based on a weighted average calculation of rates and are not majority rates. LA indicates the State of Louisiana. 2012 is the year of survey on which these classifications and rates are based. The next number, 007 in the example, is an internal number used in producing the wage determination. 5/13/2014 indicates the survey completion date for the classifications and rates under that identifier.

Survey wage rates are not updated and remain in effect until a new survey is conducted.

Union Average Rate Identifiers

Classification(s) listed under the UAVG identifier indicate that no single majority rate prevailed for those classifications; however, 100% of the data reported for the classifications was union data. EXAMPLE: UAVG-OH-0010 08/29/2014. UAVG indicates that the rate is a weighted union average rate. OH indicates the state. The next number, 0010 in the example, is an internal number used in producing the wage determination. 08/29/2014 indicates the survey completion date for the classifications and rates under that identifier.

A UAVG rate will be updated once a year, usually in January of each year, to reflect a weighted average of the current negotiated/CBA rate of the union locals from which the rate is

based.

WAGE DETERMINATION APPEALS PROCESS

1.) Has there been an initial decision in the matter? This can be:

- * an existing published wage determination
- * a survey underlying a wage determination
- * a Wage and Hour Division letter setting forth a position on a wage determination matter
- * a conformance (additional classification and rate) ruling

On survey related matters, initial contact, including requests for summaries of surveys, should be with the Wage and Hour Regional Office for the area in which the survey was conducted because those Regional Offices have responsibility for the Davis-Bacon survey program. If the response from this initial contact is not satisfactory, then the process described in 2.) and 3.) should be followed.

With regard to any other matter not yet ripe for the formal process described here, initial contact should be with the Branch of Construction Wage Determinations. Write to:

2.) If the answer to the question in 1.) is yes, then an interested party (those affected by the action) can request review and reconsideration from the Wage and Hour Administrator (See 29 CFR Part 1.8 and 29 CFR Part 7). Write to:

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The request should be accompanied by a full statement of the interested party's position and by any information (wage payment data, project description, area practice material, etc.) that the requestor considers relevant to the issue.

3.) If the decision of the Administrator is not favorable, an interested party may appeal directly to the Administrative Review Board (formerly the Wage Appeals Board). Write to:

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4.) All decisions by the Administrative Review Board are final.
